AN APPEAL TO THE INTELLIGENCE OF THE NEGRO RACE BY PROVISIONAL PRESIDENT OF AFRICA GREAT SUCCESS OF 2nd INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION NOW IS THE TIME TO SUPPORT THE WORK OF UNIVERSAL NEGRO IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION

Fellow Men of the Negro Race, Greeting:

Now that our great Convention has risen, and our representatives have gone back to the four corners of the world from whence they came, it is for us of the Universal Negro Improvement Association to speed on the great program we have before us. We have a great deal of work to do for the speedy realization of our aims and objects.

Every bit of our program can be put over if our people will but bend their energies and lend their help to the great cause. Wheresoever we go, we hear the cry of oppression. Everywhere Negroes are looking out for relief. Why not come, therefore, universally and bring about the necessary emancipation as a relief from all the ills we suffer? We are suffering industrially, commercially and politically. Mere complaints will not solve these difficulties. Mere speeches, letters and petitions will not solve them either. The only way the great problems confronting the race can be solved, is through united action, and united purpose. For the bringing about of this result, the Universal Negro Improvement Association called its second International Convention. The opportunity was given to every delegate from every part of the world, to lay his complaint before the bar of the Convention.

We heard the cry of Africa, the cry of America, the cry of the West Indies, the cry of South America, the cry of Central America, and the cry of the entire universe.

Basing our knowledge upon the information gained through the complaints of the Delegates from the various parts of the world, we were able to make laws and pass resolutions that will ultimately bring about a readjustment of conditions everywhere. Several hot-headed and irresponsible critics have tried to attack the usefulness of the Second International Convention, but that has been the way of the Negro for centuries. Negroes who have never been able to do anything, Negroes who can do nothing, have always sat on the fence criticizing those who do things, always advising them how things should be done, and always having "good thoughts," after they have listened to the better thoughts of those who are original enough to initiate something in the interest of the race. The Universal Negro Improvement Association has made it a policy not to take any notice of irresponsible critics, but owing to the unpreparedness of our race generally, to analyze criticisms, in that a large proportion of our people generally take what is written and said for the truth; we have to somewhat depart from our policy in now warning the masses of Negroes everywhere, against the criticism of the representatives of spasmodic movements among irresponsible Negroes who are endeavoring to advocate violence in destroying governments, hot-headed egotists, who believe that Rome was built in a day, and expect the Negro race just by the shaking of the wand, to bring about a free and redeemed Africa. We are not living in the age of the magician. We are living in a practical, material matter-of-fact age, when things must be done through hard competition, and not by the mere wish that the thing be done.

All those who desire to be fair, will readily admit that the Universal Negro Improvement Association has accomplished wonders within four years. Taking an organization with thirteen

members, on the road but four years, having now four million organized the world over, is an accomplishment that ought to be appreciated by every one.

Everybody seeks to criticize the Universal Negro Improvement Association, because everybody has done nothing to warrant being criticized. Everybody is now talking about Africa; some have an "African Blood Brotherhood," some are holding "Pan-African Congresses" and everything is now African.

We are glad of the change as brought about through the propaganda of the Universal Negro Improvement Association of four years. We only hope that those so-called friends of Africa will act in the interest of Africa; seeking to put aside their side issues and fall in line with the bigger ideas of the Universal Negro Improvement Association that seek to emancipate Negroes everywhere. No Negro is too big, no Negro is too small not to find a place in the Universal Negro Improvement Association; then why organize on the side? Every Negro organization and movement was invited to the Second International Convention of Negroes. Every man was given a chance to speak for us to determine of what stuff he was made, and for that purpose we gave every man a chance for nearly two weeks. Some said it was a waste of time, but how could we discover men of ability, how could we reveal to the world the men who were fit and capable if we did not give them a chance to be heard? Yet, some of these wisecracks criticize us for listening to men of the race for two weeks.

Before a doctor can treat a case, he has to diagnose the patient, before the Universal Negro Improvement Association can alleviate conditions of Negroes everywhere we must know of the conditions, and we can only know of the conditions by giving an opportunity to those who come from the different parts of the world to explain themselves.

We have before us one great task, and that is putting down the selfish egotistic Negro who has been simply a stumbling block in the way of the race for the last 300 years, and lift the race from misrepresentation and perfidy, up to the heights of economic, religious, social and political freedom. We are asking the support of Negroes everywhere.

Now is the time for every man and woman to fall in and help the Universal Negro Improvement Association put over this program. It is no use debating, it is no use arguing if it can be done. It must be done. It is a question of doing it now, or preparing ourselves to die tomorrow.

All people who are capable of holding a place in the world are now preparing to do so by arguing if it can be done, by determining among themselves that it must be done. The Irish say there must be a free and independent Ireland, the Egyptians say there must be a free and independent Egypt, the Jews say there must be a free and independent Palestine, the Universal Negro Improvement Association says there must be a free and independent Africa for the four hundred million Negroes of the world.

now come for the four hundred million Negroes to build an empire of their own upon which the sun will never set. In moving toward this end, all of us cannot be left behind.

In waging a propaganda, the thing said yesterday must for diplomacy sake, after you have succeeded, be changed tomorrow for the greater effect, and we think that the Universal Negro Improvement Association is always be giving expression to radical and revolutionary ideas, not the full grasp of human efforts and human wisdom. Study the rise of peoples, of governments, of nations, and you will find that at certain times they have had diplomats.

Those who lead cannot always be propagandists. The movement will be nothing but a propaganda movement. We start with our propaganda, and later we have to produce. Between the start and the finish we have to produce of different calibres, for different purposes, then have to or any group criticize the Universal Negro Improvement Association for not doing certain things, and wishing to see it absolutely, as though the change that must be made for the higher realization of the ideals we have in mind.

Most members of the Universal Negro Improvement Association will pay no attention to the criticisms of the movement, but that all of us will focus our resources, our all, on the great object of a free Africa, and in carrying out this plan, we can only do it with our united support. 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IMPRESSIVE CEREMONIES MARK CLOSING OF HISTORIC WORLD-RENEWED SECOND ANNUAL INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION OF NEGROES

LIBERTY HALL, New York, Wednesday Evening, Aug. 31, 1921.
Without commotion, yet with becoming dignity and impressive ceremony, religious and patriotic fervor, the Second Annual International Convention of Negroes of the World closed tonight with the sound of the gavel and the pronouncement of His Highness, the Potentate, the Hon. Gabriel M. Johnson, Mayor of Monrovia, Liberia, Africa.

Divine Services Held in the Morning; Music and Speechmaking Features of Last Evening Session—Remainder of Day Appropriately Celebrated as Universal National Holiday Among Negroes

RESOLUTION ADOPTED AND SENT TO SUPREME COUNCIL AND LEAGUE OF NATIONS STRONGLY PROTESTING AGAINST PARTITIONING OF GERMAN SOUTH AFRICA AND ITS DISTRIBUTION AS SPOILS OF WAR WITHOUT CONSULTING WISHES OF CIVILIZED NEGROES OF THE WORLD.

LIBERTY HALL, New York, September 4, 1921.—"The new year of 1921-1922 for the Universal Negro Improvement Association will be a year of strenuous labor. 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NEW YORK WORLD MAKES EXPOSE OF KU KLUX KLAN

Presents an Amazing Story of the Terroristic Secret Society That Has Spread to Every State in the Union but Three—The Whole Truth from Inside Sources—Series Said to Be Result of Months of Investigation by The World and Reveals Every Detail of Klan's Attack on Negroes, Jews, Catholics and Naturalized Citizens.

The New York World began last Tuesday the daily publication of a series of articles about the Ku Klux Klan. It is the result of an inquiry that has been conducted by that newspaper for the past three months, embracing not only the South but all other sections of the country. The World declares that it has undertaken this publication because it believes it is in the public interest to let the people know the truth about the organization.

It is said in the first article that the Klan has grown to a membership of more than 50,000; that it is established in every State in the Union but Montana, Utah and New Hampshire, and that it is growing more rapidly in the North and West than it is in the South. It is said also that in seeking members the Klan attempts first of all to get the members of the courts and members of the police department, and that they then turn to reserve officers of the army and navy.

The charge is flatly made that the Klan is a seditious organization. It is said that for each new member \$25 is paid, and that the work is done by a number of men in each town. It is said that in one instance related by the World a Negro was taken to a public square in New York City to be lynched. The interesting point is also made that the original Ku Klux Klan was a definitely anti-Negro organization, the present Klan is an anti-Negro and anti-Roman Catholic organization. This is a very important aspect of the World's report.

It is said that the members of the Klan have come into the possession of the World, it declares. Excerpts are made from those parts in the form of photographs and in the form of quotations from them. Other photographs that are used are of the leaders of the Klan, of actual Klan meetings and of parades. However, Prof. Ferris, my article on Garveyism and your review are the talk of the people in town. I thank you for the interest you are creating by your scholarly and masterly manner of editing The World. Surely, whoever selected you knew how to get the right man for the right place.

Your review shows that you are a splendid grammarian, an excellent rhetorician, a splendid philosopher, and almost a past master in logical deductions. This I wish to offer through the columns of your paper as my reply to your review.

A FITTING RECOGNITION

Dr. J. R. A. Crossland, of St. Joseph, Mo., Who Lost His Only Son in Late War, Appointed Special Expert in U. S. Veterans' Bureau — Will Look After Interests of Colored Soldiers and Sailors

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 28, 1921. — A recent enactment by the U. S. Congress has abolished the Bureau of War Risk Insurance and, in its stead, has created the U. S. Veterans' Bureau, which consolidates under one head all the powers hitherto vested in the Bureau of War Risk Insurance, Federal Board of Vocational Training and U. S. Public Health Service. The creation of the U. S. Veterans' Bureau is the result of a bill (H. R. 8111) introduced by Hon. Burton K. Sweet, of Waverly, Iowa. Hon. Charles R. Forbes, of Seattle, Washington, was recently appointed and sworn in as Director of said U. S. Veterans' Bureau.

One of his first official acts, evidencing his deep interest in colored ex-service men, was to appoint Dr. J. R. A. Crossland, a loyal and active Negro Republican of St. Joseph, Missouri, as a "Special Expert" in said Bureau. Dr. Crossland, whose only son, during the recent World War, made the "supreme sacrifice" will especially look after the interests of colored soldiers and sailors and see that they are given all the rights, opportunities and benefits to which they are entitled under existing law. With a force of colored stenographers, etc., he will have his quarters in the main Veterans' Bureau Building, corner Vermont Avenue and E. streets, Washington, D. C., and will be in constant communication with the colored ex-service men of the country.

It is believed that Dr. Crossland's appointment will be a great benefit to the colored ex-service men of the country, and that it will result in the speedy settlement of their claims for compensation, etc.

of reasons: (1) He gave his only beloved son during the recent World War as a priceless tribute to the Altar of Patriotism, which makes him vitally interested in the welfare of all ex-service men; (2) for years he has been an active Republican, persistently pleading with tongue, pen and influence for the triumph of Republican principles and Republican candidates; (3) he is a whole-souled race man, widely and favorably known in fraternal, political, business, educational and religious circles—one who has been successfully engaged in the practice of medicine for the past thirty years and actively identified with numerous efforts for civic, educational, business and other forms of racial uplift. He is the man for the place, capable in every way of looking after and safeguarding the interests of ex-service men of our racial group. He was the only man, white or black, of the entire Missouri delegation, who was unanimously elected a Delegate-at-Large to the last Republican National Convention. He served under President Roosevelt as U. S. Minister and Consul-General in the Negro Republic of Liberia, in Africa. As a medical practitioner he has won success and renown, and ex-soldiers are fortunate in having a man of this caliber, deeply interested in their welfare, to look after and prosecute their just claims.

Upon being interviewed by your Washington correspondent, Dr. Crossland said: "My appointment is in line with the wishes very cordially expressed by President Warren G. Harding, Col. Charles R. Forbes, newly appointed director of the United States Veterans' Bureau, and by Major Dean, head of the Vocational Department of said bureau—all of whom are determined to see that colored ex-service men get a square deal and are treated identically the same as other ex-soldiers and sailors. Of course, I am deeply gratified because of my appointment—not so much because of the personal recognition involved, but because it shows that the President and Col. Charles R. Forbes both keenly appreciate the worth of ex-service men of our racial group and are determined to see that they are given a square deal and are treated identically the same as other American soldiers and sailors in all matters that pertain to their rights under existing laws. My deep and abiding interest in the welfare of ex-service men is plainly witnessed by the fact that my only son, my only child, was their comrade in the recent world war and made the "supreme sacrifice," dying in the honored uniform

of an American soldier. While I am proud of his record, yet I would rather have laid down my own life in defense of our country's flag than to have lost my boy—my only son, upon whom the fondest hopes of his mother and father were based. Ex-service men will find in me a true friend and an energetic advocate of all of their rights and interests, and I accept the call because I feel that, in a sense, I am only taking up the work left unfinished by my son and am giving up a successful medical practice only because I feel that this new field of labor is one that will afford me an opportunity to render the greatest service to my country and to the patriotic, proven in so many ways, merit for them tangible recognition and encouragement. Negro soldiers played an important part in the recent world war. Over 1,000,000 of them were called to the colors, as drafters, and 400,000 of them actually served as soldiers and sailors under the "Stars and Stripes," and bared their bosoms to the bullets of the enemy, in the Argonne forest, St. Mihiel and Metz. And in every war that has confronted the American Republic Negro soldiers and sailors have distinguished themselves and acts of bravery. The first American blood shed in the Revolutionary War was that of Crispus Attucks, a Negro. Negro sailors aided Perry on Lake Erie. Negro soldiers, nearly 200,000 strong, helped to "save the Union" in the 40's and merited for their entire race Lincoln's emancipation. If there ever was a time in the country which called for a public exhibition of friendship and gratitude on the part of strong white Americans toward loyal and patriotic members, and especially ex-service men of our racial group, this is the hour, and I believe that my appointment is but an emblem of the splendid spirit now so necessary and now existing. I am especially grateful to my Congressman, Hon. Charles L. Faust, to Senator Seiden P. Spencer, and indeed to the entire Missouri delegation in Congress, as well as other prominent and influential citizens, both white and colored, who have so warmly indorsed me and who have so loyally and actively supported me on this position. I shall give to the position the very best that is in me. It shall be my aim, through real satisfactory service to remove the dependent feeling that now seems to prevail throughout the length and breadth of this country, especially among ex-service

men; to win and deserve their confidence and co-operation; to develop my office, now consisting of only a few colored helpers, to a size more in keeping with the large number of ex-service men of our racial group whose interests are to be carefully looked after, and to conduct my office on the highest plane of practical efficiency.

IS THE NEGRO A CITIZEN OF THIS COUNTRY?

Is the Negro a citizen of this country, as are other men? In time of war he is called on to fight, but discriminated against even there at a time when the world's democracy was at stake. If he isn't recognized as a full-fledged citizen in time of war, in time of peace he isn't recognized at all. That is clear, and the fool has no need to err. Does he play a citizen's part in time of peace as well as in time of war? He proves himself equal to every task to which he is assigned. He has proved himself a hero on every battlefield in time of war as well as in time of peace to make this country safe for democracy. In the World's War it was the 2,000,000 colored soldiers that sent the Kaiser back across the Rhine and caused him to sign the armistice, saving France, England and America forever from ruin. Now if 2,000,000 Negroes can do that much for somebody else, how much more can 400,000 do for themselves! Therefore let us continue to organize until we are one solid mass as firm as the rock of Gibraltar. For years the Negroes of this country

have been begging for the rights of full citizens, but nothing real has been achieved. Nobody cares for a beggar; in fact, it is a disgrace to beg for things of great value, as citizenship, with all rights guaranteed. Begging is oil to the axis of the wheel of destruction to any race or nation. The early settlers of this country had a hard time under the cruel hand of Great Britain as long as they begged for their rights. They were taxed without reason to help pay England's war debts without being allowed a representative to say how much tax they should pay. The early settlers of this country stood this cruel treatment until it was unbearable. But after all oppression was good for them; it taught them, as the cruel hand of the lawless white man is teaching the Negroes throughout the world, the value of organization. Patrick Henry, the prophet of the revolutionary war, said "Liberty or death." It was a hard fight; but their cause, as ours, was just and right. God was on their side, and they won the victory (their independence). The U. N. I. A. and A. C. L. is the medium through which the Negroes are to gain their freedom and rights. If this is the white man's country, he ought to have it to himself and have only white people to rule. Africa is ours, and there we must rule supreme. All intelligent Negroes know that this is the white man's country, and every intelligent white man knows that Africa is the black man's country. The Negroes of this country will no longer make fools of themselves by begging for rights, but shall demand them, as other men have done. If he is struck, he is going to strike back; he is going to defend himself against the

lawless white savages, as in the Tulsa riot, although he may be tried by the devil's court afterward for justice. To maltreat a dog makes him your enemy, and to maltreat a human being is more so, as well as dangerous to the maltreater. The law, worthless as executed, becomes a worthless law. It is a wise saying, "Nothing is settled until it is settled right." Although the whites started the Tulsa clash by trying to lynch an innocent Negro boy, the colored people are now being indicted by the wholesome and the whites by the retail. The better class of white people know this isn't fair, but the lawless, who are in a majority, do not care; they have no regard for the right, but seek only vengeance. By this unfairness and maltreatment we as a race shall profit. They drive us to unity and teach us the value thereof. There is but one solution to the race problem and that is Garveyism; namely, every nation under its own vine and fig tree. J. B. L. Boloy, Ohio.
