S. J. Branch, **Famous Realty** Man, Slain

Samuel J. Branch, a Negro whose operations in Harlem real estate had brought him considerable money, was to death just before 3 a. m yesterday by two men who awaited him on the stairs of the hall of his apartment at 167 West 146th Street Music of a band playing "Give Me Something to Remember You By" ir nearby dance hall drowned out sounds of two shots and persons pass-ing in the street did not hear them

Tenants in the house heard Branch's scream of "Murder!" but his wife Clarice, who was asleep in their third floor apartment heard nothing

Detectives from the 135th Street Station found Branch's body in the rear of the building. One bullet had entered his left side and the other his chest. Caught in the lining of his Tour of South right hip pocket was his own loaded 32 caliber revolver. Neighbors said that he had collapsed after running own the back stairs.

The discovery in the dead man's pocket of \$369 in money, twenty-five checks, four bank books and a watch puzzled detectives. Mrs. Branch could think of no motive but robbery for the attack, because, she said, her husband's dealings were in business and residential property and he had avoided renting to night club or speakeasy proprietors. Mr. Branch was a member of the Harlem Assoa captain in the Republican organiza-

Criminals in Such Localities; Wickersham Report Scores Conditions

NEED HIGHER ABILITY

To Cope with This and Foreign-born Residents Here

WASHINGTON, D. C.-Lack of fficient subordinate officers and parolmen in racially segregated districts is listed among the defects of police administration in this country by the Wickersham commission in its Report on Police," submitted to President Hoover and made public

at the White House last Saturday. The report links the difficulties of detecting crime and arresting the criminal in areas in large cities in which the foreign-born are segre-gated with similar difficulties in districts in which Negroes are segre-

Dealing with the phases of police administration among the foreignoorn and Negroes in large cities, the eport states:

"The excessive rapid growth of our cities in the past half century, to-gether with the incoming of so many millions of immigrants, ignorant of our languages, laws and customs, and necessarily adhering in their racial segregations in large cities to the language and customs of their native lands, has immensely increased the difficulties of the police in detecting crime among the foreign in such lo-

calities and arresting the criminal.

Foreigners are Suspicious "The inborn suspicion by the for-eigner of all police officers and their unwillingness to expose a criminal of their race has made more difficult, if not impossible, in our country than in cities abroad the arrest and prosecution of a criminal, and especially

any notorious one of such race.





Britain Admits Beheading Rebels Foreign Born Protest In India, Orders Practice Stopped

We reprint below from the Chicago Tribune of July 20, a news dis-patch from its special correspondent in India, relating inhuman cruelties perpetrated by the British in the called Burmese rebellion.

By WILLIAM SHIRER SIMLA, India. — Reports from Burma that British government force cut off the heads of captured rebels and brought them back to headquarhere in official circles today.

The government admits that the bodies of 22 rebels were decapitated, but offers an explanation why this was done. It furthermore has issued an order that no more rebel heads

The report of the decapitation of Burmese rebels and the confirmation of it by the government itself have created a profound impression in the country and brought nation-wide protest against the "frightfulness" of forces engaged in putting down the rebellion.

The government explanation of its action is that the heads of the rebels were brought in for purposes of iden-According to a spokesman for the

Colleges Give 1,980 In South Africa Degrees to Negroes

Total Enrollment Throughout America in Both Colored and White Institutions Was 10,500.

WASHINGTON .- According to an article appearing in the recent issue of the Crisis, 1,980 Negroes received degrees during the collegiate year of 1930-31 out of a total of 18,500 student enrolled in colleges throughout the nation.

Howard University, of this city, led the list with 222 graduates out of a student body of 2,473. Prairie View College, of Texas, was second with 135 graduates out of a total of 997 students. Fisk University, of Nashville, with an enrollment of 473, had

101 graduates. Returns from other colleges inluded Hampton, 82 graduates; South Carolina State, 34: West Virginia State, 27; Virginia Union, 31; Orleans, 40, Tuskegee, 28; Morehouse 68; Morgan, 70; Clark, 53; Lincoln of Pa., 60; John C. Smith, 67; Shaw, 48; Talladega, 58; Knoxville, 34; Spelman, 24; Livingston, 24; Bennett, 29; Straight, 11; Paine, 7; Virginia Theological, 12, and Arkansas Baptist, 7.

White Universities.

Ohio State University, with approximately 300 Negro students enrolled, had 18 graduates. Temple University, of Philadelphia, its near-est competitor, was an enrollment of 189, had 7 graduates. Fifteen Negroes were graduated from the University of Illinois: 11. New York University; 14, Iowa; 12, Boston Univer sity; 14, University of Chicago; 22, University of Pittsburgh; 2, Yale; 8, Columbia University, and 15 from Hunter College. Of the 2,063 Negroes enrolled in 62 white northern universities, 250 received degrees,


